Collie says he has been very fortunate in his ca-reer, and hopes his success during his broadcasting will carry over into his duties at the Chamber. His "people skills," communication skills, and a special affinity for online and In-ternet marketing are sure to serve him well in his new

The self proclaimed "Facebook addict" says he is eager to reinvigorate the Chamber's Facebook page and continue to expand the Chamber's utilization of its Web site. He has hit the ground running, immediately sending out informa-tive and timely e-mail alerts to Chamber mem-bers about upcoming events and happenings in the Waterville region.

Collie is very about his new job. excited

"I've inherited a great sit uation here, not only because of the great work that (former Executive Director) Chris Bolan has done in this position over the last 12 years, but also because there is so much excite-ment in the area with the new owners up at the Mountain (The Sununu family at Waterville Val-ley)," said Collie. "Also, we have a great Visitor's Information Center (VIC). Som chambers do great work in the local business commu nity, but don't necessarily have the benefit of a VIC like this one. It is a tremen-dous asset. It is very con-venient, right off the highway. It is the arrival point for Waterville Valley. It is a

hub and a gateway to the White Mountains, and so many people stop off here for information about local attractions and amenities."

Collie says his biggest surprise in the job is just exactly how busy the Visi-tor Information Center has been since he started in De-cember. He has been told that an estimated 60,000 visitors stop off at the Center in the course of a calendar year; from locals and seasonal residents wanting Fish and Game licenses and snowmobile registrations to travelers needing to find a restroom, the VIC is a very busy place.

Collie says that given the amount of traffic coming through, the benefit of be-ing able to advertise your local business at the Center is one of the greatest ad-vantages of being a Chamber member.

"Membership has its advantages," says Collie, vantages," says Collie, clearly already a seasoned sales person. But managing

the Visitors Center, open during the winter from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday through Monday, and all week during the Massachusetts and New Hampshire vacation weeks in February, is only one of his important responsibilities.

He is already hard at work on the upcoming B.A.S.H. (Business After Scheduled Hours), to take place on Feb. 3 at the Common Man Inn and Spa in Plymouth. The event will be a great op-portunity for locals to meet Collie (if they haven't already) and network with their colleagues from around the region. There will be a drawing for the "Supercash Raffle," a limit-ed number of tickets avail-able at the WVRCC Visitor's Info Center, and a host of door prizes, as well.

When not in the Visitor's Center, Collie has been on the road, visiting Chamber members in Campton, Thornton, Plymouth and Waterville Valley and pro-

Chamber's the moting Hometown Guidebook, which will be published in March. The deadline is approaching for inclusion in the Guidebook, which fea tures a director of local businesses and informa-tion on local services and attractions. The chamber expects to publish 12,000 copies of the guidebook and direct mail them to more than 5,000 residents and businesses in the region, as well as distribute them at many public locations.

In addition to all these ac tivities, Collie says he will also work to serve as an accurate and objective "vehi-cle of information" for chamber members about the controversial Northern Pass project, for electrical transmission lines coming through the area. He is also organizing a contingent of local business community members planning to at tend "Small Business Day" the New Hampshire

State House on Feb. 1 in

Concord. As if that were enough to keep him busy, the ambitious, up and com-ing professional business leader and his wife are expecting their third child in

a couple of weeks. Oh, and by the way, you can still catch him on air from time to time on 95.7, WZID, out of Manchester (usually on the weekends).

Collie says he hopes folks will stop by the Visitor In-formation Center to say hello, and he looks forward to meeting everyone over the course of the next few months.
